#### WHO ARE WE?

As a community, we welcome and celebrate human diversity - including spirituality, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, and abilities.

We aim to create a space where people of any faith or none can question and discover the sacred in life through openness, struggle, laughter and prayer, lived out through a common commitment to be in solidarity with the poor and marginalized, and to cherish Creation.

#### CHILDREN

Children play a central part when we gather to worship. We welcome them as they gather for a Children's Time at the beginning of the service. We send them off with a song for Sunday School, and they return in time for Communion—the Lord's supper. A Nursery Room is available for parents with babies and toddlers at the back of the Church.

#### **HOLY COMMUNION**

ALL are welcome to come forward and receive communion, the divine life of Jesus which comes to us in gifts of bread and wine. Come as you are. Instruction for people joining this meal the first time can be found on page 10.



### † Fourth Movement: Celebrating the Lord's Supper

#### The Offertory

During the hymn, the bread and wine for the Lord's Supper are presented alongside with the offering of money to symbolize the offering of ourselves and of the whole creation to God in thanksgiving for the many blessings we experienced.

At the conclusion of the hymn, we praise God and sing

Praise God the source of life and birth, Praise God the Word, who came to earth. Praise God the Spirit, Holy flame. All glory, honour to God's name.

#### Thanksgiving at the Table

This is a ritual meal to re-enact the Last Supper that Jesus shared with his friends to remind them of his sacrificial love for humanity and the whole creation. All stand as able.



Celebrant: God of wind and flame, we praise your wild beauty flying free in the shining air.

Your Spirit nurtured life in outrageous diversity; she raised up judges to protect the weak, made kings dance in ecstasy, and prophets burn with holy anger.

Through the Spirit, the Word became flesh and the world was called to hear his voice; she drove him to the desert his first sure step to victory over death and division.

When he left his followers, she was poured out on all flesh and crossed the line between male and female, slave and free, Jew and gentile.

She is with us now, bringing Christ near - filling our worship, guiding us in hope.

Therefore, with all God's rainbow people, and all who have tasted the Spirit of life, with the thirsty and the cold, and all who long to dream again, we worship your glory as heaven touches earth:

#### Sanctus & Benedictus (sung twice)



Celebrant: We ask that your Holy Spirit will fall upon us and upon these gifts that these fragile, earthly things may be to us the body and blood of our lord and brother, Jesus Christ;

who, on the night that he was betrayed, gathered with his faltering friends for a meal that tasted of freedom. Calling them to his table, he took bread, gave thanks, broke it and said:

"This is my body, which is given for you.

Do this to remember me."

In the same way after supper, he took the cup, saying:

"This cup is the new covenant in my blood.

Do this, whenever you drink it, to remember me."

As on the that night, so here and now, he offers himself in touch and taste beyond all words can hold.

Great is the mystery of faith

#### All: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Celebrant: Therefore we come in memory and hope, responding to your call and the promise that echoes from the dawn of all time.

May mind and heart be held by your self-giving love as we stand before the cross, approach the empty tomb and praise the one whose name is lifted high above all earthly power.

Receive our broken offering through his all-powerful grace and bind us in communion with all who share your gifts; through Jesus Christ, in whom all ages and all the worlds are drawn into the ceaseless love of Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

All: Amen.

Celebrant: As our Saviour taught us, let us pray:

#### The Invitation

#### **Receiving Communion**

If you know the brokenness of life, its fractures within and its division without, then you have participated in the broken body of Christ and you are invited to share in the breaking of bread.

If you desire to know the love of God that overcomes indifference and despair, if you desire the reconciliation that overcomes estrangement and alienation, then you are invited to share the cup of the new covenant.

The bread is received in the open palm. It is usual Anglican practice to drink the wine from the common cup. Wine and unfermented grape juice are served. If you would prefer to receive a gluten-free wafer or grape juice, please inform the person administering the bread or wine when they approach you. If you would prefer to receive a blessing instead of Communion, you are welcome to come forward and place your hands across your chest.

#### Prayer and Laying-on of Hands for Healing

We invite those who desire healing for themselves or on behalf of someone else, to come to the front of the line to receive the bread and wine. Immediately after receiving Communion, proceed to the prayer station beside the votive candles on the right-hand side of the sanctuary. Give your first name and briefly state your prayer need. A member of the Clergy will offer you the Laying on of Hands and Anointing.

#### **Prayer After Communion**

Celebrant: God of peace,

All: In this eucharist, we have been reconciled to you and to our neighbours. May we who have been nourished by holy things always have the courage to forgive. We ask this in the name of Jesus Christ the Lord. Amen.

#### **Family Thanksgiving**

All are invited to share if they know of any birthdays, anniversaries or other celebrations. As sharing concludes, all say "Amen."

Celebrant: Glory to God,

All:
