

From the Rector

Happy New Year! I hope you all had a delightful holiday time filled with light, meaning and renewed relationships. This Sunday we shall celebrate the Epiphany of the Lord, a special feast day that concludes Christmastide (or the Twelve Days of Christmas). In the Western churches, the Epiphany ('the manifestation') became an occasion to celebrate one element in the story of Christ's birth, the visit of the far-travelled magi, understood as the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles. Matthew's account speaks simply of 'wise men from the east'; later tradition fixed their number at three, made them kings, and recalled their resonant names — Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar. Today we shall follow the ancient tradition of blessing chalk in honour of these three saints for the use of blessing our own homes.

Epiphanytide (beginning today until February 2, the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple) is an apt season to pray for the worldwide mission of the Church. The feast of the Conversion of St Paul, the Apostle to the Gentiles, appropriately falls in the Epiphany season, as does the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

At St. Hilda's, we invite you to reflect on the mission of the Church through the lens of **STEWARDSHIP** over 2 meaningful events during Epiphanytide. You are invited to a **special congregation meeting on January 11** following the 10 o'clock service to discuss how we shall resource our mission in this coming year. The Treasurer will update us on our 2014 year end finances and the wardens will present some of the giving trends they have identified and invite your inputs and ideas on how to prioritize our mission focus in 2015.

Also on **Wednesday January 14 at 7 pm**, you are invited to participate in a meaningful community dialogue on LNG, Pipeline and Tankers. The proposed development of LNG industry in British Columbia have profound impacts on our lives and for many generations to come. The issues are complex and controversial. The main goal of this event is to create a safe space in our community to listen and dialogue on this multifaceted topic. "...real dialogue presupposes an openness to modify deeply held convictions." We hope many of you will be able to participate at this event on January 14.





Children's Time: Blessing of the Chalk

Children are invited to come forward

Celebrant: Let us pray.

Bless, † O Lord God, this chalk** that it may be helpful to all and grant by the invocation of thy Most Holy Name that whosoever shall use it or inscribe with it the names of thy Saints Gaspard, Melchior and Balthazar upon the doors of their homes, may through their merits and intercession, enjoy health of body and protection of soul; through Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.

After the reflection, all rise as able. People on the aisle are invited to form an arch for children to come through as they head out for Sunday School as we sing:

151 All Poor Folk and Humble (vs 1)

All poor folk and humble, all lame folk who stumble, come haste ye, and be not afraid; for Jesus, our treasure, whose love passes measure, in lowly poor manger was laid. Though wise men who found him laid rich gifts around him, yet oxen they gave him their hay; and Jesus in beauty accepted their duty: contented in manger he lay.

Then haste we to show him the praises we owe him; our service he ne'er can despise, whose love still is able to show us that stable where softly in manger he lies.

Prayer over the Gifts


Celebrant: Good and loving God,

Eucharistic Preface




Celebrant: We praise you, God of many names, whose spirit runs free through all the earth, whose image lies deep in every mortal soul.

Celebrant: Gracious God,

in the fullness of time you sent Jesus the Christ to share our fragile humanity.

Through Jesus' life, death, and resurrection you open the path from brokenness to health, from fear to trust, from pride and conceit to reverence for you.

Rejected by a world that could not bear the Gospel of life, Jesus knew death was near.
His head anointed for burial by an unknown woman, Jesus gathered together those who loved him.
He took bread, gave thanks to you, broke it and gave it to his friends, saying, "Take and eat: this is my body which is given for you.
Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper, Jesus took the cup of wine, gave you thanks, and said, "Drink this all of you, this is my blood of the new covenant which is shed for you and for many. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

And now we gather at this table in response to his commandment,

to share the bread and cup of Christ's undying love, and to proclaim our faith.

All: Christ is died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Celebrant: Breathe your Holy Spirit,
the wisdom of the universe,
upon these gifts that we bring to you:
this bread, this cup,
ourselves, our souls and bodies,
that we may be signs of your love for all the world
and ministers of your transforming purpose.

Through Christ, with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory is yours, Creator of all, and we bless your holy name for ever.

All: Amen.

Celebrant: Gathered around the table by the Holy Spirit, let us pray as Jesus taught:



Receiving Communion

If you know the brokenness of life, its fractures within and its division without, then you have participated in the broken body of Christ and you are invited to share in the breaking of bread.

If you desire to know the love of God that overcomes indifference and despair, if you desire the reconciliation that overcomes estrangement and alienation, then you are invited to share the cup of the new covenant.

The bread is received in the open palm. It is usual Anglican practice to drink the wine from the common cup. Wine and unfermented grape juice are served. If you would prefer to receive a gluten-free wafer or grape juice, please inform the person administering the bread or wine when they approach you. If you would prefer to receive a blessing instead of Communion, you are welcome to come forward and place your hands across your chest.

All: with our eyes we have seen your salvation, and in this meal we have feasted on your grace. May your Word take flesh in us, so that we may be your holy people, revealing your glory made known to us in Jesus Christ, our Saviour and Lord. Amen.

All are invited to share if they know of any birthdays, anniversaries or other celebrations. As sharing concludes, all say "Amen".

Closing Blessing

Celebrant: May God the Father,

who led the wise men by the shining of a star to find the Christ, the Light from lights, lead you in your pilgrimage to find the Lord.

All: Amen.

Celebrant: And the blessing of God:

Life Giver, Pain Bearer, Love Maker be among you and remain with you always.

O holy and everlasting God, we ask you to hear us and send your holy Angel from heaven to guard and cherish, protect and visit, and evermore defend all that dwell in this house. I call upon thy Saints – Gaspard, Melchior, and Balthazar – to protect my Family and my home from every harm and danger, and, I place this mark over my door to remain as a constant reminder to us and all who enter here that my house is truly a house of the Lord.

O God, make the door of my house the gateway to thine Eternal Kingdom.

All this we ask through Jesus Christ thy Son our Lord. Amen.

WHO WE ARE

St. Hilda's, situated on the unceded traditional territory of the shishálh First Nation, is a member of the Anglican Church of Canada and the worldwide Anglican Communion. As a community, we welcome and celebrate human diversity - including spirituality, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, and abilities. We aim to create a space where people of any faith or none can question and discover the sacred in life through openness, struggle, laughter and prayer, lived out through a common commitment to be in solidarity with the poor and marginalized, and to cherish Creation.

CHILDREN

Children play a central part when we gather to worship. We welcome them as they gather for a Children's Time at the beginning of the service. We send them off with a song for Sunday School, and they return in time for Communion—the Lord's supper. A Nursery Room is available for parents with babies and toddlers at the back of the Church.

HOLY COMMUNION

ALL are welcome to come forward and receive communion, the divine life of Jesus which comes to us in gifts of bread and wine. Come as you are. Instructions for people joining this meal the first time can be found on p. 11.

Parking for people with disabilities are available next to the Meditation Labyrinth. You are welcome to bring your walker or wheelchair into the sanctuary. If you have hearing difficulties, please ask one of the greeters for a sound enhancing headset.
