WHO WE ARE

St. Hilda's, situated on the unceded traditional territory of the shishálh First Nation, is a member of the Anglican Church of Canada and the worldwide Anglican Communion. As a community, we welcome and celebrate human diversity - including spirituality, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, and abilities. We aim to create a space where people of any faith or none can question and discover the sacred in life through openness, struggle, laughter and prayer, lived out through a common commitment to be in solidarity with the poor and marginalized, and to cherish Creation.

CHILDREN

Children play a central part when we gather to worship. We welcome them as they gather for a Children's Time at the beginning of the service and then send them off to Sunday School. They return in time for Communion—the Lord's supper (grape juice is available for communing). A Quiet Room is available for parents with babies and toddlers at the back of the Church.

HOLY COMMUNION

ALL are welcome to come forward and receive communion, the divine life of Jesus which comes to us in gifts of bread and wine. Come as you are. Instructions for people joining this meal for the first time are printed in the bulletin.

Rector's Note:

This Sunday marks the last Sunday of the liturgical year. We gather to observe the Feast of the Reign of Christ, a day when the Church celebrates the all embracing authority of Christ as King and Lord of the cosmos. The image of Christ as our King from on high ruling and judging us may be too triumphant for some of us to relate to. I want to invite you to open your heart to a deeper spiritual truth that the readings and images of this feast are inviting us to enter into: that this Jesus is more than that historical teacher and miracle worker in Galilee, he is the Cosmic Christ who is the Alpha and the Omega, our beginning and our end. He is present throughout the whole cosmos continuing his work to gather, heal, and unite us into the oneness of God. Thus, the Kingdom of God is simply another way to articulate that reality of unity with God which we and the whole world yearn for. In a week where we have been flooded with news of the aftermath of the terrorist attacks in Beirut and Paris, a week when we learnt that one of our regular guests at our Cold Weather Shelter was found dead outdoors in Gibsons, we shall cry out to our King of Love:

May your kingdom come!

Worship this Morning:

We shall begin our worship with a Solemn Procession and a special sung litany. The Solemn Procession, a unique ceremony which may not be familiar to some of you, is a very physical way for the gathered community to pray by walking all around our worship space. Our walking and praying following the Processional Cross represent the very presence of Christ in the midst of our physical and spiritual space. The sung litany gathers us to lament for the destruction and death in our midst and pray for the coming of God's kingdom.

If you would prefer to receive a blessing instead of Communion, you are welcome to come forward and place your hands across your chest.

Christianity: A Coming of Age - Many thinkers today believe we are entering a “Second Axial Age”— a great shift in consciousness and spirituality equal in weight to that which produced the headwaters of our great religious traditions between roughly 800-200 BCE.
