WHO WE ARE

St. Hilda, situated on the unceded traditional territory of the shíshálh First Nation, is a member of the Anglican Church of Canada & the worldwide Anglican Communion. As a community, we welcome & celebrate human diversity - including spirituality, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, & abilities. We aim to create a space where people of any faith or none can question & discover the sacred in life through openness, struggle, laughter & prayer, lived out through a common commitment to be in solidarity with the poor & marginalized, & to cherish creation.

CHILDREN

Children play a central part when we gather to worship. We welcome them as they gather for a Children's Time at the beginning of the service and then send them off to Sunday School. They return in time for Communion—the Lord's supper (grape juice is available for communing). A Quiet Room is available for parents with babies and toddlers at the back of the Church.

HOLY COMMUNION

ALL are welcome to come forward and receive communion, the divine life of Jesus which comes to us in gifts of bread and wine. Come as you are. Instructions for people joining this meal for the first time are printed in the bulletin.

Worship in Holy Week

Welcome to the Palm Sunday, also known as the Sunday of the Passion. This day marks the beginning of the week-long commemoration of the Christian Passover when we watch and remember the deep love of God revealed through the Passion of Jesus Christ. I encourage you to take part in as many of the rich liturgies offered at St. Hilda's, Living Faith and St. John's -- our ecumenical partners.

Barbara Brown Taylor, an Episcopalian priest and theologian in her book *Learning to Walk in the Dark* says:

I have learned things in the dark that I could never have learned in the light, things that have saved my life over and over again, so that there is really only one logical conclusion. I need darkness as much as I need light.

Holy Week is about Christ Jesus, the Word made flesh, surrendering himself to enter the darkest place of human soul: the place where everything is foreign and unfamiliar, nothing is within my control, the place where I am often afraid of.

Today, we begin with Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. The procession with palms is accompanied by a dramatic reading of the Passion Narrative, in which the whole story of the week is anticipated.

On Monday evening, we will gather to remember how a woman named Mary seals Jesus' journey toward his suffering and death with faithful sacrificial love which we can smell, see and touch.

At the Seder Supper on Wednesday (signing up is required), we shall return to Jesus' Jewish roots to learn and experience the Jewish Passover, a meal that celebrates God's liberation.

Join our friends at Living Faith Lutheran on Maundy Thursday for an ecumenical service which contains a rich complex of themes: humble Christian service expressed through Christ's washing of his disciples' feet, the institution of the Eucharist, the perfection of Christ's loving obedience through the agony of Gethsemane.

On Good Friday we gather and wait at the foot of Jesus' cross to bear witness to all those whose lives have been consumed by the violence of our world then and now. There is also an opportunity to spend a moment to pray before the Taizé cross of Reconciliation.

On Easter Sunday, you are invited to gather for a Sunrise Service at Mission Point Park at 7 am, followed by breakfast at St. John's United. Our principle Easter celebration will be at 10 am.

I hope that you would be convinced, especially during this time when our world is so deeply divided, that our need to BE ONE in Christ worshiping together outweighs the inconvenience of not worshiping in our familiar liturgical space.



Receiving Communion

If you know the brokenness of life, its fractures within and its division without, then you have participated in the broken body of Christ and you are invited to share in the breaking of bread.

If you desire to know the love of God that overcomes indifference and despair, if you desire the reconciliation that overcomes estrangement and alienation, then you are invited to share the cup of the new covenant.

The bread is received in the open palm. It is usual Anglican practice to drink the wine from the common cup. Wine and unfermented grape juice are served. If you would prefer to receive a gluten-free wafer or grape juice, please inform the person administering the bread or wine when they approach you. If you would prefer to receive a blessing instead of Communion, you are welcome to come forward and place your hands across your chest.
