We enter a new season of the church
in which we celebrate the beauty and the life of Creation.

Rocks and hills and trees and flowers,

how we see the divine in Creation
and our responsibility for it all
in the light of divine love and compassion.

This Creation season we again give thanks
for earth and sea and sky
for brilliant autumn colours contrasting with blue-green planet.
We lament the times we and others have taken this world for granted
and not allowed all creatures a free and clean space in which to live.

We give thanks also for this community,
also a creation of beauty and variety formed over many years
in which we know and walk the Way of Jesus together.
For music and relationships, for reflection and affirmation,
for bread and wine shared together,
we give thanks this day and ask
that we may allow all we have been given
to enhance and enrich our lives
and through us, the lives of others.

WELCOME TO OUR CHURCH

Whoever you are, and wherever you find yourself in your journey of faith, you will find a place at our table at St. Hilda's Anglican Church. Come as you are. There are many ways and there is no one particular way to be a part of this vibrant community. Join us today with an open mind, and be prepared to discover a home for your spirit that is inclusive, incarnational, and joyful.

CHILDREN

Children play a central part when we gather to worship. We welcome them as they gather for a Children's Time at the beginning of the service and then send them off to Sunday School. They return in time for Communion—the Lord's supper (grape juice is available for communing). A Quiet Room is available for parents with babies and toddlers at the back of the Church.

HOLY COMMUNION

ALL are welcome to come forward and receive communion, the divine life of Jesus which comes to us in gifts of bread and wine. Come as you are. Instructions for joining this meal for the first time are printed in the bulletin.

ACCESSIBILITY

Parking for people with disabilities is available next to the Meditation Labyrinth. You are welcome to bring your walker or wheelchair into the sanctuary. The community is invited to pray in silence. At the sound of the singing bowl, please stand as able for the processional hymn.

Celebrant In the name of God, who creates all life,
In the name of Jesus Christ, who redeems all life,
and in the name of the Spirit, who renews all life,
we cry with all in the circle of life:

All: Shalom! Shalom! Shalom! May your blessing come!

Celebrant God created the animals—birds of the air, fish of the sea, and the many beloved creatures who walk or crawl on the earth—and God declared them all to be good. The glory of a deer and an elk running, the beauty of an eagle in flight, the majesty of a porpoise leaping: all display the wonder of sacred life. We are gathered here today to bless the animals that are in our midst, those who are our very close companions, and to ask for God's blessing on these friends and on the many animals who share this earth with us. We are also here to repent, to recognize that, as powerful animals ourselves, we do not always live kindly with all of God's creatures. We pray that this time together, a time of recognition of the gifts and worthiness of every living being, will remind us that all life is precious to God. Jesus Christ, we assemble with all your creatures in this circle of life.

ALL We ask you to join our circle and celebrate with us.

Blessing of Pets

Celebrant Life-giving Creator of all, we ask your blessing on every animal gathered here today: the ones with two legs or four, the large and the small, the furry and the fluffy, the barking and the squawking. May they live joyfully and peacefully, praising you as they live out the lives you intended for them. Bless us all to love your creation and revere its sacredness. Give the humans present the gift of compassion, with eyes to see suffering and hearts that strive to end it. We ask this blessing in the name of the one who was, is, and always will be our Creator, to whom every creature belongs.

Owners are invited to bring their pet down the aisle for an individual blessing. The clergy will touch each animal, call them by name and bless them with these words:

[Name], the power of this blessing from Christ fill you with life, bind you to your human partners and lead you to praise your Creator. Amen.

Those who have lost their beloved pets recently are invited to come forward to the Remembrance Board in the corner. You may place a photo or write the name of your pet on the photo board & light a candle in remembrance of your pet friend(s).

Following the blessing, children may proceed to Sunday School, visitors are welcome to stay for the Communion Service commemorating the 13th century saint, Francis of Assisi, who inspired generations of people to live a radical life of simplicity and gratitude in harmony with God's creation. If you are leaving the service at this point, we thank you for visiting us with your beloved pet friend.

Receiving Communion

If you know the brokenness of life, its fractures within and its division without, then you have participated in the broken body of Christ and you are invited to share in the breaking of bread.

If you desire to know the love of God that overcomes indifference and despair, if you desire the reconciliation that overcomes estrangement and alienation, then you are invited to share the cup of the new covenant.

The bread is received in the open palm. It is usual Anglican practice to drink the wine from the common cup. Wine and unfermented grape juice are served. If you would prefer to receive a gluten-free wafer or grape juice, please inform the person administering the bread or wine when they approach you. If you would prefer to receive a blessing instead of Communion, you are welcome to come forward and place your hands across your chest.
