



The Offertory

During the hymn, the bread and wine for the Lord's Supper are presented alongside with the offering of money to symbolize the offering of ourselves and of the whole creation to God in thanksgiving for the many blessings we experienced.

Eucharistic Prayer

Celebrant: The Spirit of God be with you. All: And al-so with you.





The Invitation


Receiving Communion

If you know the brokenness of life, its fractures within and its division without, then you have participated in the broken body of Christ and you are invited to share in the breaking of bread.

If you desire to know the love of God that overcomes indifference and despair, if you desire the reconciliation that overcomes estrangement and alienation, then you are invited to share the cup of the new covenant.

The bread is received in the open palm. It is usual Anglican practice to drink the wine from the common cup. Wine and unfermented grape juice are served. If you would prefer to receive a gluten-free wafer or grape juice, please inform the person administering the bread or wine when they approach you. If you would prefer to receive a blessing instead of Communion, you are welcome to come forward and place your hands across your chest.

Parish Events and Notices

<u>Sunday Worship in the Hall</u>: As repair work began on the north wall of the sanctuary, it was discovered that the north and south walls were out of plumb. A structural engineer was called in and he instructed that a roof truss tie rod be installed immediately to properly support the roof which has sagged. Until the remediation is completed, the sanctuary is closed for public assembly. As Hospitality is one of St. Hilda's Mission Principles, it is our duty to ensure safety for all who are gathered to worship at St. Hilda's. Please continue to remember this remediation project in your prayers.

Next Sunday — Celebrating the Feast of St. Mary Magdalene, Apostle of the Apostles: We shall gather next week to observed the Feast of Mary Magdalene for the first time on a Sunday at St. Hilda's. Last year Pope Francis raised the July 22 memorial of St. Mary Magdalene to a feast on the church's liturgical calendar by his decree titled "Apostolorum Apostola" ("Apostle of the Apostles"). In recent years, Mary Magdalene has been re-discovered by scholars and spiritual teachers as an icon bearing witness to the Wisdom of Christ. Come and celebrate a special liturgy prepared by the Worship Committee and encounter Mary anew.

Mark your calendar for Parish Picnic: Church Committee has set the date for the Parish Picnic to be held on Sunday, September 10 following after the 10:00 am service at Porpoise Bay Provincial Park Group Day Use area. This would be a good day to welcome everyone back and an opportunity to invite new friends to share our fellowship.

The book being studied is Farley Mowat's *Rescue the Earth: Conversations with Green Crusaders* which consists of conversations between Mowat & proponents of several of the most active & representative of the combat units in the environmental movement. Though written in the 90s, the insights of this generation of green crusaders continue to inspire and challenge us. All are welcome.

Gospel of Thomas: is breaking for the summer and will resume September 8.


<u>Inner Journey - CRMC</u>: There will be no service in August. It will resume on September 17.

St. Hilda's Mission Principles

At St. Hilda's our aim is to create a sacred space where we can be nourished and nourish others through our practices of Worship, Hospitality, and Justice.

Hospitality: The Lord's Table is the foundation of our understanding of hospitality - a safe place where all are welcome just as they are, broken yet blessed, all seeking food that satisfies. We aim to be an inclusive, sacred space in our community. We support a variety of expression of Spirit where people are committed to listen to each other, honour each other's beliefs and perspectives, and to create a safe environment for healthy, vibrant dialogue with friends and strangers alike.

Worship: As a Christ-centred community, our parish recognizes worship as a means of inspiring connection to the Divine through prayer, contemplation, music, and liturgy, with lay and ordained participation. We offer a variety of worship services to honour the diverse worshiping style of our community. We value community more than an ascribed set of beliefs.

Justice: Our faith informs us that the foundation of our practice of justice is right relationship with all of creation. Jesus calls us to seek out, serve, and learn from those who are marginalized.
