Rector's Note

Peace, joy, and love to you on our Patronal Feast Day!

Hild (or Hilda, her Anglicized name), the patron of our parish was a woman ahead of her time who founded and ruled monasteries for both men and women and brokered peace between powerful Roman imperial forces and local Christian expressions at the gathering remembered at the Synod of Whitby (664 AD). The monastery she founded in Streoneshalh became a centre for learning, where literature and the arts were encouraged and vocations were fostered. The Ven Bede, a 7th-century historian, describes Hild as a woman of great energy who was a skilled administrator and teacher. She had a concern too for ordinary folk. Bede wrote, "All who knew her called her mother because of her outstanding devotion and grace."

In celebration of Hild, Worship Committee has been working on a new Eucharistic Prayer that references several Celtic spiritual principles and reflects the theology our parish embraces. The Committee is excited to unveil our latest draft at worship this morning. This Eucharistic Prayer was crafted following these principles: Trinitarian belief;

- a deep respect of nature and creation, especially "thinning places;"
- quiet care for all living things; a wanderlust or migratory nature;
- love of silence and solitude; praising God through everyday life with great joy;
- the value of soul friends (Anam Cara) and hospitality;
- the image of the Wild Goose as an expression for the Holy Spirit from the Iona Community.

This prayer is a work-in-progress and we plan to seek permission from our Bishop for local/diocesan use.

Also, please welcome ReelTime Celtic Ensemble who will be enhancing our worship music this morning. Thanks to Katherine for arranging this!

We are so grateful to have Hild, our Mother-in-faith to model for us how to be a follower of Jesus in a changing turbulent time. I invite you to follow Hild's example as an ambassador of Christ's reconciliation on St. Hilda's Day this year to support Bill C-262 which will be having its second reading in our Parliament on December 4. This Bill, endorsed by our Primate (the presiding bishop of the Anglican Church of Canada) and St. Hilda's Social Justice Umbrella, asks the Government of Canada to take all measures necessary to ensure that the laws of Canada are in harmony with the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. You will find more information in the bulletin and at the information table set up by the Social Justice Umbrella this Sunday.

I bless you with ancient words ascribed to Hild of Streoneshalh:

Trade with the gifts God has given you. Bend your minds to holy learning that you may escape the fretting moth of littleness of mind that would wear out your souls.



mountaintops, labyrinths, rivers and seas,


ancient trees and sacred groves


where we feel the presence of the One

Sacred Presence of the liminal places, send your Spirit of the Wild Goose on these gifts so that we know Jesus in them and that we may be gathered together with every pilgrim who seeks refreshment and wisdom in this sacred meal.

By our eating and drinking, we affirm with joy that Christ is present with us now, and throughout time to come. The Sacred Three, our fortress be Encircling us Come and be round our hearth and my home, where all shall be well,



KAIROS' CALL TO ACTION

St. Hilda's **Social Justice Umbrella** is inviting all parishioners to answer the invitation from our ecumenical partner KAIROS to express our ongoing solidarity with and advocacy for *the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples* (UN-DRIP) by supporting Bill C-262.

Bill C-262 is an act asking '...the Government of Canada to take all measures necessary to ensure that the laws of Canada are in harmony with *the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples*.' First presented to the Parliament in April, 2016, C-262 has been scheduled for its second reading on December 4, 2017 in the House of Commons.

You are invited to sign a postcard addressed to our Member of Parliament, Pamela Goldsmith-Jones, to show your support this Sunday. A delegation from the Social Justice Umbrella is scheduling a date to meet with our MP to convey your support.

People of faith might understand the UN Declaration as a new covenant, written on our hearts, and a way to begin renewing the relationship between indigenous and non-indigenous peoples that so needs truth, healing, and justice.

Suggested messages for handwritten postcards:

- ◆ Bill C-262 can change Canada's future and move us toward respectful relations with Indigenous nations. I urge you to support Bill C-262, "An Act to ensure that the laws of Canada are in harmony with the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples."
- ◆ The Truth and Reconciliation Commission has stated that the adoption of UNDRIP is foundational to any genuine reconciliation in Canada. Bill C-262 can make that happen. Please support this "Act to ensure that the laws of Canada are in harmony with the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.
- ◆ I pray for the federal government, as I pray for myself: that we would have the courage to seek justice and do the hard work required to repair the damage of colonialism. Please support Bill C-262, "An Act to ensure that the laws of Canada are in harmony with the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples."
- Over 370 million Indigenous peoples worldwide support the protection of their basic rights as peoples and individuals. We don't need more consultation. We need to legislatively adopt the UNDRIP. Support Bill C-262, "An Act to ensure that the laws of Canada are in harmony with the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples."
- ◆ Change of any sort requires courage. My prayer is for the Canadian Government to right a wrong that has been too long in the making. Please support Bill C-262, "An Act to ensure that the laws of Canada are in harmony with the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples."
- ◆ Colonial laws and structures continue to oppress Indigenous peoples daily in our country. Please support Bill C-262, "An Act to ensure that the laws of Canada are in harmony with the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples."
