Rector's Musings

Lent: A Ritual Journey

Whether you are new to the Christian faith or are seasoned wayfarers, welcome to the season of Lent, one of the few times in the Christian year when we are collectively invited to stop and take stock of our relationship with God and creation. Lent is essentially a ritual journey. By ritual, I'd refer to Fr. Richard Rohr's recent daily meditation on the difference between ceremonies and rituals: "Ceremonies normally confirm and celebrate the status quo and avoid the shadow side of things... True sacred ritual is different than mere ceremony because it offers an alternative universe, where the shadow is named and drawn into the light."

In these coming 40 days, while our senses are naturally drawn to the lengthening daylight, the liturgy of the church invites you to take notice of something else: the shadows side of your life. Jesus is the master of shadow work as well as a victim of the violence from humanity's unchecked shadows. He shows us a way through the shadow of the cross to a fearless way of living fully we sometimes called salvation.

WHO WE ARE

Celebrant Let us lay down our brokenness before God in the presence of one another


ALL We confess to you the truth of our broken lives.

Receiving Communion

If you know the brokenness of life, its fractures within and its division without, then you have participated in the broken body of Christ and you are invited to share in the breaking of bread. If you desire to know the love of God that overcomes indifference and despair, if you desire the reconciliation that overcomes estrangement and alienation, then you are invited to share the cup of the new covenant.

The bread is received in the open palm. It is usual Anglican practice to drink the wine from the common cup. Both wine and unfermented grape juice are served. If you prefer to receive a gluten-free wafer or grape juice, please inform the person administering the bread or wine when they approach you. If you prefer to receive a blessing instead of Communion, you are welcome to come forward and place your hands across your chest.
