Introduction

We welcome our brothers and sisters from churches across the Coast and our visitors on this most holy day to remember the Passion of our Lord.

This Good Friday Liturgy invokes all of our senses to meet our Beloved Christ. The service consists of three major parts:

- 1. Scripture Readings (our listening and our minds)
- 2. Praying around the Cross (our touch and our hearts)
- 3. Holy Communion (our taste and our hunger)

We begin the liturgy in silence. In humility and solidarity, the congregation is invited to surrender to the God of Love in the face of chaos and violence.

We then continue with the Liturgy of the Word. We recount and reflect on our Lord's Passion through the reading of holy scripture, meditative music and preaching.

The liturgy continues with a reflection of the Cross. Afterwards you are invited to enter into the Liturgy of Praying around the Icon Cross of the Taizé Community. The ecumenical community of Taizé in France was founded with the hope to be a sign of reconciliation between divided Christians and between separated peoples. The Community gathers and reaches out to young people from all around the world and calls them to pray together for trust, peace and reconciliation. Every Friday night at Taizé, the Icon Cross is placed flat on the floor of the Church of Reconciliation. All present are invited to come forward to the cross. As a gesture of their solidarity with the poor and oppressed peoples of the world, pilgrims place their foreheads on the Cross and remain there for a few moments. This symbolic gesture brings home very clearly that Christ still suffers in the downtrodden and victims of injustice in the world today. Through the liturgy, people come in touch with their own brokenness and pain and find it in their hearts to forgive both themselves and others. They become very much aware of the fact that the sufferings of Christ, as an act of total love, are for them personally, as well as for the rest of humankind. The Spirit of God enables people to seek repentance and healing and to know deep within themselves that they are indeed loved.

You are all invited to come and place your forehead on the cross on which hung the Saviour of our world. Come as the Holy Spirit guides and moves you. Come as yourself, a sinning beloved and may the love of Christ transform you.

The service concludes with Holy Communion from the reserved sacrament consecrated on Maundy Thursday. In partaking, you are invited to enter into sacramental union with Jesus the Victim of the Cross. By so entering into His passion and death, we are carried along to the glory of His resurrection. After the final hymn following Holy Communion, the congregation departs in silence.

Gathering

At the sound of the singing bowl, all rise as able as the Sanctuary party enters. The Ministers pray on behalf of all who gather.

Minister 1: O Christ Saviour, like the seed fallen to the ground,

you suffered death. United to you, our life will bear much fruit.

ALL: We see you, Lord!

Minister 2: O Christ, you experienced betrayal, ridicule, rejection; you remain close to all who are abandoned.

ALL: We see you, Lord!

Minister 3: In your love you overcame the fear of death; you gave us the courage to choose life.

ALL: We see you, Lord!

Minister 1: By your love you conquered evil and hatred, and you live for ever with the Creator.

ALL: We see you, Lord!

Minister 2: You listen to us in your goodness

and you visit us in our deep confusion;

fill our hearts to overflowing

by revealing to us the passionate love on your face.

ALL: You see us, Lord!

Prayer of the Day

Minister 3: Let us pray,

Our Creator, maker of heaven and earth, on this Good Friday, our whole world is engulfed in shadows as we remember the story of Jesus' death. It hurts to think of the betrayal and arrest of Jesus.

It hurts to imagine Jesus abandoned and suffering on the cross with only a faithful few watching him breathe his last breath.

Minister 1: But we must find our place in this crucifixion story and feel the pain that is there: the pain of the world, the pain of the earth, the pain of the children; so that we may know the other side of pain, which is healing and life-sustaining.

Minister 2: Jesus entered that pain out of faithfulness to you and to us, to witness to the Truth that is Justice, Wholeness and Love.

ALL: Strengthen us with your courage; offer glimpses of hope in the shadows of death; let us know you are present with us here in this moment so that our hearts may be broken open to love one another as Jesus loves us. Amen.

In Christ our fear of death hangs with savage intensity.

In the shadow of the cross, we lay

the fear that haunts us,

the lives short-lived in fear and trembling, the dreams of peace that die still-born, the cries of those who thirst and hunger, the clenched fists that love longs to open.

Chant Jesus, Remember Memusic on p. 7, sung twice

Minister 1: Behold the Cross upon which Embodied-Love was executed!

Minister 2: We see Christ in whose body was named

the poverty of this world; In Christ our greed and hatreds pierce and wound the heart of God. In the shadow of the cross, we lay our self-centered foolishness, our silence at the pain of others, our tight-held grasp on power, our failures to respond with grace, our simple-minded lack of courage.

Minister 3: Neither darkness, death, nor evil acts can conquer LOVE.

LOVE transforms the cross

from an instrument of torture, terror and death to a symbol that proclaims the power of LOVE

to stand up for justice so that through justice

we can achieve peace in all of creation.

Praying Around the Cross

The Icon Cross of Taizé will be placed at the centre of the Church. Beginning with the sanctuary party, all are invited to come forward and gather around the Icon Cross to pray.


Chants during Prayer:

Sharing Holy Communion

The congregation stands as the reserved sacrament (consecrated last evening at the Maundy Thursday Liturgy) is being processed in.

Presider: As our Saviour taught us, let us pray:

Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name.
Your kingdom come.
Your will be done on earth as in heaven
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.
Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen

Presider: The gifts of God for the people of God,

ALL: Thanks be to God.

The sacrament of Holy Communion comes to us in gifts of bread and wine. There are two communion stations accessible from the centre aisle. Wine is served in the silver chalices and grape juice is in the potter chalices. If you would prefer to receive a non-wheat wafer, please inform the person administering the bread when they approach you. If you would prefer to receive a blessing instead of Communion, you are welcome to come forward and place your hands across your chest.

Short Silence is observed after everyone has had communion.



Dismissal

Minister 1: For I am persuaded that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. Go in peace.

ALL: Thanks be to God.

All depart in silence.
