Message from Fr. Ayoob

Dear Friends,

Today, I want to focus on the Psalm 130 and the Gospel of John 11:1-45. I see the main topic is: The word of God is Hope. No one likes to wait, and yet life is full of waiting. Waiting on the mail. Waiting on answers to our questions. Waiting on traffic lights. Waiting for the end of our work shift. Waiting in self-isolation for 14 days for COVID 19 symptoms results. Waiting for the disappearance of the pandemic and disease.

Psalm 130 is a psalm about waiting. It is one of the psalms of trust, and yet it almost begins as a psalm of trouble. The psalmist is crying out to the Lord from a place of deep pain and distress.

The Psalmist has a simple yet profound message for us today. Those who wait on the Lord wait in hope. We don't wait in desperation or despair – those who wait on the Lord wait in hope. This psalm intricately weaves the paradox of dread and sin with hope and trust through the promised forgiveness of Yahweh.

It's important to understand that God never promised us a life free from problems and challenges. Even people who love God are not immune to trouble.

Our part is to not hang on to problems, but to give them to Him – this shows true trust in Him. God wants to help us, but we have to let Him help us by releasing our trials to Him. God expects us to lift our eyes to Him, not to keep our eyes on our problems. When we continually look at our problems instead of at God, we feel overwhelmed and hopeless. To have hope during troubled times, we must focus on God, not our difficulties. When we realize that our help comes from the very Maker of the Universe, hope fills our heart and mind.

Jesus encouraged His disciples and followers several times "do not let your hearts be troubled." They have to put their trust in God, and trusting God is the key to having hope and peace in the midst of trials.

Life is hard – but God is good! We must not allow ourselves to lose hope during difficult times. Instead, when we trust in God, keeping our focus on Him and casting our problems on Him, we will have hope and peace regardless of our circumstances.

As we seek for relief and rescue from the current problem, we need hope in the midst of the global pandemic of COVID-19, that the death that has occurred across the world can be taken away.

In the story of the death of Lazarus, when Jesus heard this, He said, "This sickness will not end in death. No, it

is for God's glory so that God's Son may be glorified through it." John 11:4.

I have been asked if it is God's plan that we became ill. Who would ever wish illness on anyone, especially our loving God? I do believe, like no other experience, that the suffering, tragedy, and sorrow in our lives become the unimaginable gifts that lead us to a deeper relationship with God, others, and ourselves. This is how we experience God's boundless love, and the Paschal Mystery within our own lives: we fall down; we struggle; we rise up. We go on living with our loving God.

"Jesus wept." These two words clearly reveal Jesus' compassion for our pain and trouble. Although Jesus knows that he can bring Lazarus back to life, he feels deep compassion for those who love Lazarus and are suffering because of their loss of Lazarus.

What the readings are talking about here is waiting in hope. Hope is a powerful thing. Hope is a different bird than optimism. One theologian explains about optimism and hope:

"Optimism is no bad thing in itself. It is a kind of implicit confidence that things are going well in the present situation...Optimism is happy enough with the system. In contrast, genuine hope is always 'against hope.' It begins where optimism reaches the end of its tether. Hope stirs when the secure system shows signs of breaking down. Hope is at home in the world of the unpredictable where no human logic or expectation is in control. In this respect, it is never far from humility, for it acknowledges that in birth and in death human existence is never a realm of total control."

It is something that stirs outside the system. It is a proclaimed promise that occurs when optimism has reached the end of its tether. It is the good news – the gospel that Jesus died but did not stay dead.

Let's pray like the Psalmist's words (130:5):

"I wait for the Lord, my whole being waits, and in his word I put my hope." Amen.

God, source of healing, cast the light of health and wellbeing on those who've been exposed to COVID-19, those who have contracted the disease now and in the future. Bless us, protect us and bring us speedily to full recovery.

Bless all who are ill with healing of body, healing of soul and healing of spirit, we ask in Jesus's name our healer and saviour!

During this time when fear grips our world, let us choose to love. During this time when we cannot physically wrap our arms around each other, let us find ways to be the loving embrace of the Holy One to our neighbour. *Amen.*

We welcome with deep gratitude this generous assistance. Parish Council and Trustees will review the impact of this on our financial picture for this year.


